### THE WORLD OF K.D. SWAN: EARLY 20TH CENTURY PHOTOGRAPHER AND CONSERVATIONIST

A screening of this acclaimed documentary film by local producers Marcia Hogan and Libby Langston. The film describes the establishment and early years of the National Forest system through the life and remarkable photographs of K.D. Swan. From 1911-1947, this forester-artist recorded the beauty and value of public lands in the Northern Region. The story is told by historians Dr. Char Miller and Dr. Mary Murphy, by Forest Service retiree Bud Moore, and by Swan's daughter, Helen Bolle. The film was recently recognized as an Official Selection at the 2009 Montana CINE International Film Festival. # DAVID THOMPSON IN THE FORESTS OF KOOTENAI AND SALISH COUNTRY

A presentation by Jack Nisbet on the explorer David Thompson and his early journeys through western North America. Between 1800 and 1812, North West fur trade agent and cartographer David Thompson recorded the first written accounts of a vast swath of the northern Rockies and western Montana. He used those daybook entries to create the first accurate maps of the region, often incorporating tribal and geographical information onto his sheets. This illustrated presentation will focus on the forests Thompson described, the way he saw local Kootenai and Salish bands using those trees, and the many building and carpentry projects he set him men to

while developing the Inland Northwest's first circle of fur trade posts. Spokane-based teacher and naturalist <u>Jack Nisbet</u> is the author of two books about fur trader David Thompson: <u>Sources of the River</u> and <u>The Mapmaker's Eye</u>, as well as the essay collection <u>Visible Bones</u>. The Pacific Northwest Booksellers Association has named Nisbet's most recent project, <u>The Collector: David Douglas and the Natural History of the Northwest</u>, as one of their 2010 Books of the Year.
